ZONE 2 MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- The 2016 AFGA Annual Conference is being held from February 18 to 20, 2016 in Edmonton (info package attached). The cost is \$400 per person, plus hotel and meal costs. Are we sending anyone?
- There are a number of Alberta Conservation Association (ACA) grants and AFGA Minister Special License grants available to provide funding to fish and game clubs for community or habitat projects. Last year some of these grants were not issued because no one applied.
- Lots of discussion around the Suffield elk hunts and some statistics on Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD). Not much to report.
- Reminder that some Alberta counties will donate trees and shrubs for habitat projects.
- Reminder to get the appropriate liquor license for events depending if it's open to the public or members & invited guests only.

- The AFGA Wildlife Banquet is on 2016-04-23 in Edmonton.
- Cabela's can provide grants to fish and game clubs or provide space at the store for events/meetings. They'd prefer win-win's, where we get free space and they get more traffic in the store or visibility at an event. Cabela's invited any club to have a table/booth at the Cabela's spring or fall "Great Outdoors Days". Their marketing contact is Sean.Smallwood@cabela s.ca
- Suggestion from another club to obtain a fishing derby permit (Competitive Fishing Event) for future OFGA fishing events to minimize issues with Fish and Wildlife enforcement.
- Early indications are that 2016 Pike and Walleye limits will be reduced to zero on the following southern lakes: Crawling Valley, Badger, Little Bow Reservoir.
- The next AFGA Zone 2 meeting will be held at the Strathmore Wheatland clubhouse on 2016-05-01.

Action Items

- Any resolutions (such as youth fishing clarification) that we want raised with the AFGA must be drafted and passed by our local club, submitted to the Zone 2 director, and then it will be raised to the AFGA Executive. We've missed the 2016 deadline but can submit a resolution for the 2017 conference.
- Deb Clarke, the Zone 2 director, wants a list of the OFGA 2016 events and dates.
- The AFGA is looking for community involvement stories from our clubs to provide content for the Outdoor Canada West magazine. The theme is "Bringing the outdoors and community together." Send stories to Deb Clarke.
- The AFGA is looking for silent auction item donations for the 2016 AFGA conference in Edmonton.




Ice Fishing Safety

As a person who works as an industrial safety consultant and also as someone who enjoys ice fishing, I am always quite cautious of traveling on ice. I am would suggest that I am not paranoid, but perhaps as someone who has a healthy respect of the dangers that are present. Over the years, I have often cringed at the sight of people on ice pushing the limits of safe travel. Do not be one of those people, and learn to respect the hazard that lurks below.

In the middle of winter, you will see lots of vehicles on the ice, which could be safe with the proper ice thickness. But it is important to remember that ice thickness can change from spot to spot on a lake.

Here are some cold hard facts about ice:

- New ice is usually stronger than old ice. Four inches of clear, newly-formed ice may support one person on foot, while a foot or more of old, partially-thawed ice may not.
- Ice seldom freezes uniformly. It may be a foot thick in one location and only an inch or two just a few feet away.
- Ice formed over flowing water and currents is often dangerous. This is especially true near streams, bridges and culverts. Also, the ice on the outside corner of a river bend is usually weaker due to the undermining effects of the faster current.
- The insulating effect of snow slows down the freezing process. The extra weight also reduces how much weight the ice sheet can support. Also, ice near shore can be weaker than ice that is farther out.
- Booming and cracking ice isn't necessarily dangerous. It only means that the ice is expanding and contracting as the temperature changes.
- Schools of fish or flocks of waterfowl can also adversely affect the relative safety of ice. The movement of fish can bring warm water up from the bottom of the lake. In the past, this has opened holes in the ice causing snowmobiles and cars to break through.
